- University Professor Craig Calhoun attended the <u>American Sociological Association's (ASA)</u>
 <u>114th Annual Meeting</u> August 10 13 in New York City. Calhoun was on the Presidential panel discussing, "Sociology's Roots in Social Justice". Calhoun also hosted a reception honoring this year's ASA President, ASU's own Mary Romero, for a career of distinguished intellectual contributions, inspiration to younger sociologists, and leadership.
- Assistant Professor Fabian G. Neuner's dissertation Elite Framing and the Legitimacy of Global Governance received the Thomas E. Patterson Best Dissertation Award from APSA's Political Communication section as well as an honorable mention for the best dissertation by APSA's Political Psychology section.
- Anand Gopal, an Assistant Research Professor with SPGS, the Center on the Future of War and the Center for the Study of Religion and Conflict, was awarded a Conflict Research Fellowship with the Conflict Research Programme at the London School of Economics and Political Science. His project focuses on field-based research in Syria and is linked to the joint Center/New America Proxy War project.
- On September 4th, Daniel Rothenberg participated in a panel and pre-opening film screening
 of "Official Secrets" with Mi-Ai Parrish, Sue Clark-Johnson Professor in Media Innovation and
 Leadership and Associate Professor Greg Bernstein and Sara Bernstein, who co-wrote the

- On August 26 27, University Professor Craig Calhoun gave the keynote speech for the

- ASU Professor of Practice Peter Bergen presented testimony in the US Congress. He spoke before the House Committee on Homeland Security in a presentation entitled "Global Terrorism: Threats to the Homeland."
- On September 10 12, University Professor Craig Calhoun was a keynote speaker on The
 Future of Work at the <u>2019 Congress of the Swiss Sociological Association</u> taking place at the
 University of Neuchâtel, Switzerland.
